Editorial: Connecting climate change research and climate action by citizens - joint programming at the local level

We are happy to present a guest editorial in this newsletter. Fokke de Jong; team Climate Change at Wageningen UR, has been long-term active as communication officer for the Joint Programming Initiative on Climate. In this editorial he brings down the often high-level, strategic and abstract process of national joint programming, to impacts for citizens and their neighbourhood. Both timely and urgent: as the need to involve citizens in co-designing mission-driven research is both asked for, and experimented with, more and more.



Besides being a member of the Climate Change Research team of Wageningen Environmental Research, I am also actively involved in climate adaptation and mitigation activities in my own neighbourhood for over ten years. There I see personally how the collective power of people is really shaping and driving ideas and solutions to get this Dutch

neighbourhood in Amersfoort city sustainable. It all started when the citizens convinced the municipality and the Dutch Railway Association, not to demolish abandoned buildings on a large industrial site. The '*Duurzaam Soesterkwartier*' association was founded. This association arranged for 250 houses, built in the 1930's and 1940's, to be insulated based on the concept of mutual and collective labour, organized by street ambassadors. This co-working between citizens, local government and private partners, resulted in fast action, and a reduction of costs for each individual household, when compared to commercial approaches. The next step was the installation of roof solar panels on 100 houses and two primary schools. Simultaneously, the association arranged a car sharing system, planned the installation of a windmill; and green areas or parks were connected in green corridors. A citizen association was formed to start plans for an 'eco-town'; *Soesterhof*, that has to deliver forty energy neutral houses in 2019. Together with students of Wageningen UR, the impact of climate change at the location of the proposed eco-town was studied, using a literature review from the national meteorological institute and with the climate services tool 'Climate effect atlas'; built by researchers from Wageningen Environmental Research, showing that increasing temperatures will change the precipitation pattern in this local area.

In 2018 people across the city are working together to arrange climate adaptable and mitigation measures on city level. A group is working on measuring heat islands in the area, and even the used methodology is, with help of a European Joint Programming Initiative on Climate (JPI Climate) project, implemented in the Norwegian city of Bergen and first steps are made to deploy this concept and methodology in other cities as well. Others groups work on destoning and greening the private gardens to avoid heat stress during summer periods, as well as aiding slowing down water run-off during extreme rain fall all over the seasons. Meanwhile, all this has also led to new companies as some of the inhabitants have turned their interests and skills to business: a sharing electric cars company, a destoning private garden foundation, or private consultancies for energy saving measures emerged. Dozens of people found each other in these activities and networks and many of them came with new ideas. When talking about joint programming in the European setting, it usually refers to mutually agreeing on what actions and what data is needed, and how countries can strengthen and build on each others' national efforts. My own experience is, that 'joint programming' is also very effective at a more local level. A level that directly involves citizens, even the climate critics.

The Active & Assisted Living Programme (AAL): a long-term transnational cooperation initiative, has launched a new call for innovative, transnational and multi-disciplinary collaborative projects. 
